B.C. partners with Stats Canada to prevent fire-related deaths

The Province has partnered with Statistics Canada to create a Community Fire Risk Reduction Dashboard to help B.C. fire services prevent fires, reduce injuries and save lives.

This is crucial given the increasing trend in fire-related deaths.

The "dashboard" will provide statistical and geographical information to help B.C.'s fire services identify areas in communities at greatest risk of home fires. This information will be used to provide safety information targeted to areas that need it most. This will help protect residents, firefighters, and reduce the social and financial impacts to communities resulting from those fires.

"Since 2020, we have seen a concerning trend of rising fire deaths across B.C. and the rest of Canada. We need to do more to keep people and first responders safe by preventing these fires from happening," said Brian Godlonton, B.C.'s fire commissioner. "The new dashboard identifies the areas most at risk of fires, so we know where to focus our fire prevention and safety programs. These advancements will not only prevent fires but, more importantly, prevent injuries and save lives."

Over the last two reporting years, there has been a 119% increase in firerelated deaths around B.C., according to the Office of the Fire Commissioner's annual report. In 2021, there were 59 fire-related deaths and 180 fire injuries. People over the age of 65 were over-represented in fire deaths. Only 42% of reported residential structure fires had a working smoke alarm.

"I'm deeply concerned about the growing number of fire-related deaths in our province. We are working on tackling this problem, and the new Community Fire Risk Reduction Dashboard will be extremely important to helping us prevent fires and save lives," said Mike Farnworth, Minister of Public Safety and Solicitor General. "I'm urging everyone to test their smoke alarms at least every six months to keep you and your family safe. Prevention is a key part of this, because fewer fires means healthier first responders and a safer province."

The Office of the Fire Commissioner will be launching pilots of the dashboard with the cities of Coquitlam, Surrey, and Port Alberni in July. The office intends to rollout the dashboard provincially in early 2023.

In early June, a volunteer firefighter with the East Wellington Fire Department near Nanaimo, B.C., has being credited for going above and beyond after rescuing a woman from a burning vehicle.

Firefighter Mark McCallum heard the crash from his home and went outside to see. The seven-year volunteer veteran called in the crash and went to investigate. A neighbour at the scene told him there was someone in the car, which had crashed into a tree and was laying in a ditch. McCallum went down the embankment and managed to pry open the passenger-side door and pull the woman to safety. "I kind of knew that I had to step up and there wasn't anybody else to turn to at that point," said McCallum. "It's kind of a life-or-death situation."

Firefighter Cancer Bill-C224 and Cancer Prevention Research Partnership

Cancer is a firefighter issue. It affects all types of firefighters in all parts of the country. While there are many important resources available, these resources don't always reach all parts of the firefighting community.

At the CAFC, a new **Cancer Committee** was started in 2022 to help further address this issue for all firefighters and department types. It is very interested in Bill C-224 proposed by MP Sherry Romanado, <u>An Act To Establish A National Framework for the Prevention and Treatment of Cancers Linked to Firefighting</u>. CAFC will do its part to help advance this bill.

Bill C-224 on Firefighter Cancer was debated in the House of Commons on April 4, 2022. You can watch the video here, read the transcripts here, and access the press release here.

The CAFC is also collaborating on a new research project focusing on volunteer firefighters, aimed at understanding what the research says about cancer prevention behaviours, whether these are understood and communicated to firefighters, whether and why these are actioned or not; and what the barriers might be.

The research is funded by the Canadian Cancer Society and the Canadian Institutes of Health Research. It runs out of the IWK Health Centre. It is in its early stages. Check back frequently for more information. Special thanks to the investigators:

Last-Minute Checklist for Protecting Your Home and Property from Wildfire





Evacuation Tips

Monitor conditions and follow the advice of local authorities.

If ordered to evacuate, do so immediately.



Review your evacuation plan for your family and pets.

Before evacuating:

- Turn off air conditioning.
- Turn off your home water and electricity
- Close all doors, garage doors and windows. If weather seal or doors have gaps, seal with duct tape.

Quickly address outside surroundings

Complete a scan around your home and property and take steps to remove combustibles.



Remove leaves, pine needles and other debris from your roof and gutters.




Mow grass and weeds within 10 metres of the house to 10 centimetres in length, or less.





Clear all dead plants, leaves, and weeds within 10 metres of your home. Maintain a 1.5 metre non-combustible zone around your home and deck by sweeping or raking down to mineral soil, rock or concrete.




Move combustible items such as toys, patio furniture, cushions, decorative items, firewood, and potted plants, that are on and under your deck and within 10 metres of your home. Move all combustible items into your home or garage.









- Secure gate in an open position.
- Clear vegetation and debris along both sides of combustible fence lines.



Check around the house

Check vents on roof, foundation and exterior walls to prevent embers from entering your home.



Check your attic and foundation (crawl space) vents to see if they are screened and in good repair. Use duct or metal tape to temporarily cover damaged vents and those with 3 millimetres mesh screening.



If you store cardboard boxes and other easily ignited materials near a vent in your attic or crawl space, move them as far away as possible from vent(s).

 Another option is to place tape over vent(s) at these locations. Be sure to remove tape when you return home.



Cover dryer vents and wall-mounted make-up air openings for furnaces with a plywood cover, metal tape or duct tape.
