

Fire Departments

First, let me start off by thanking you for taking the time to read this letter. I know all too well that time is at a premium with everyone living busier lives these days and I appreciate you giving up 10 minutes of yours. The intention of this letter is to inform you of the work that the VFABC does in the name of volunteer fire departments across our Province. If you are already a member, you may be familiar with some of them. If you are not a member, it is my hope that this letter moves you to consider becoming one of the many around the Province. We are stronger together as one combined voice and it works!

So what does the VFABC do for you? At its core, the Association is a resource for volunteer fire departments trying to navigate in today's modern fire service. It provides information, guidance, and advocates the voice of the volunteer fire department on a variety of topics at all levels of government. Last year, the Association worked on various committees along with other organizations to help improve public safety and the safety of our firefighters. As a result, volunteer fire departments had a say in changes brought forward through new Minimum Training Standard for Structural Firefighters. The Association also played a role in the discussions around the Pre-Hospital Care Scope of Practice changes, and the Emergency Medical Responder Licencing process that will bring improved emergency care for the public. The list opportunities goes on and we look forward to continuing this important work for our member departments in 2023. One last project, and one particularly important to me, is a joint venture with the BCMSA and other fire service associations to provide Psychological Wellness Training resources to all firefighters within our Province at no cost. The importance of this project cannot be understated as the impact of Post Traumatic Stress Injuries is becoming more and more evident in emergency responders. Stay tuned for more information on this project as it rolls out later this year.

As part of an internal review, the Association has heard your feedback regarding the dues structure and enrollment process being too complex. Thusly, we are making changes to streamline the process. One such change is the dues structure itself. Effective 2023, we have changed the annual dues to reflect 3 ranges based on your department's own membership numbers. The dues are now combined to provide membership in both the Volunteer Firefighter Association and the Volunteer firefighter Foundation Fund in one single fee so you no longer need to calculate and submit 2 sets of dues. For many departments, the outcome of this change will be a decrease in cost. In some cases, costs may increase slightly however, this cost will offset by the advantage in membership in both organizations. When we looked at membership data from years past, we found that many departments did not take part in the Foundation Fund. This is unfortunate as there have been many departments that have used the Foundation Fund to assist members that have been disabled and struggling to make ends meet and we are here to help.

Message from the Provincial Fire Commissioner—Staffing, data trends, new projects, and training

There have been a few new developments in the Office of the Fire Commissioner (OFC) over the past several months that I would like to share with you. Since 2008, the OFC has been with

Emergency Management BC. In December 2022, the Province made a few organizational changes, and the OFC now directly reports to Doug Scott, the Deputy Solicitor General, <u>Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General</u> (PSSG). This is great news for the OFC as it allows us to continue to strengthen our relationships with the BC Coroners Service, Road Safety BC, and other public safety organizations that fall under PSSG.

Staffing

In terms of staffing, we have added two new staff member which increases our regional presence and will result in additional support to the fire services. We are pleased to introduce Fire Service Advisors Dan Wood (Vancouver Island/Coast – south) and Brad McDonald (Vancouver Island/Coast – north). Craig Richardson, who previously acted as a Fire Service Advisor, has taken on the role of Fire Service Training Specialist, which will enable the OFC to provide dedicated support for training. Data Trends

The OFC has been reviewing the 2022 fire statistics for British Columbia and the trends are concerning. Between 2018 and 2022, there were 1005 reported fire-related injuries and 257 reported fire-related deaths. The number of reported fire-related deaths has increased each year—from 28 in 2018 to 86 in 2022. The leading causes for structure fires continue to be smoking materials (match, lighter, candle, etc.), cooking equipment, electrical, heating, smoking, and appliances. The number of fires were there were working smoke alarms is also concerning and in 2023 the OFC will be embarking on a campaign to increase public awareness of the importance of working smoke alarms. The quarterly reports for 2022 are located here: Fire Incident Reporting. Please keep sending your fire reports into the OFC so we can continue to provide comprehensive statistics to all our partners. This data provides a critical window into the overall trends which will be reflected in the 2022 OFC Annual Report. The data also informs where to best focus our resources to effectively deliver the OFC's mandate of public education and fire prevention.

New Projects

In terms of new projects, the OFC is embarking on a province-wide jurisdictional scan to better understand the recruitment, retention, and training challenges facing volunteer and composite fire departments. If your fire department is interested in participating in this scan, please email OFC@gov.bc.ca and include 'Volunteer FD Scan' in the subject line.

Training

If your department requested training curriculum materials from the OFC to support your department in achieving the <u>BC Structure Firefighter Minimum Training Standards</u>, you should have received the documents. As a reminder, requests for curriculum materials are to come from the fire chief. All parts of the request form must be completed and sent to <u>OFC@gov.bc.ca</u>. The form can be found at: <u>Training Curriculum Request Form</u>. More information on the training standards can be found on the OFC website: <u>Structure firefighter minimum training standards</u>. Occupational Awareness Training for BC Fire Fighters

Program Overview

The Psychological Wellness Course Series for BC Fire Fighters is a 12-module program designed to enhance frontline knowledge of mental health injuries and reduce the emotional and behavioural impact of a career in public safety. The curriculum combines the lived experience of those serving on the frontline with recognized subject matter experts in the field of public safety mental health. After viewing each module, crews will participate in a structured group-based discussion that is designed to: reinforce key learning objectives, normalize common psychological stress injuries and contribute to the collective resilience of each company. By the end of year 1, course participants will be provided a toolkit of "self-rescue" strategies and a clear pathway to accessing occupationally aware healthcare resources in British Columbia.

Program Roll-Out

Beginning in April 2023, all BC fire fighters – full-time, paid on-call and volunteer, will gain free access to this peer-reviewed, evidence-informed program that is delivered via a digital education platform. Learners will be given access to progressive modules that builds on overarching themes related to positive psychology and the achievement of optimal performance in and beyond the fire service. For best learning outcomes, crews can complete each module in-station and on-duty with access to a downloadable workbook that serves to facilitate group discussions.

How Can You Help - Survey

In preparation for this new training program, our committee is seeking to gain a snapshot on how fire personnel currently view their existing knowledge of mental health and wellness when it comes to the fire service. The information you provide will be invaluable in forming future educational initiatives that contribute to organizational health and promote individual mental wellness in and beyond the fire service.
